On Saturday Nov. 16, 2024, Osman Koroma from ABVI will be riding 50 miles on ABVI's new, custom built tandem bicycle

This new bike will enable our visually impaired to enjoy the simple activity of bike riding like the rest of the sighted world can.

We are asking Lions Clubs of 11-C1 to help in two ways.

1. Osman will need a tandem rider. If we have a new rider with him every 5 miles, we will need 10 volunteers. If we provide a new rider every 2.5 miles, we will need 20 riders to help.

We are also looking for clubs to set up aid/water/encouragement stations along the path. Possible where the new rider jumps in.

- 2. The tandem cost \$14,500. We are looking for pledges from each club, Lions members and the public to help defray the cost so ABVI can use their own funds to provide their services to the visually impaired. We will use ABVI's website to collect pledges and donations and each one will be credited to the Lions Club or the individual.
- 3. Osman Koroma is the Employment Coordinator for ABVI, a Grand Rapids Lions member and is visually impaired.

MUSKEGON NORTHSIDE LIONS EDUCATION MINI - GRANTS

The world suddenly became a different place four years ago. With the ever-changing demands of COVID restraints, it meant all of us had to adjust, and one area that was hit particularly hard was education. Allocated funds to many schools just couldn't support those new demands from the CDC. With a few former and present educators as members of the Northside Lions Organization during that time, they guickly began thinking of ways to assist educators with the ese added needs. They knew that every student would need access to his/her own materials to ensure that supplies could be kept sanitary. To supply elementary classrooms would be one thing, but what about secondary schools where teachers see the access of a hundred-thirty students a day? Thus, a team of Northside Lions formed the education mini-grants for Muskegon Northside (Reeths-Puffer and North Muskegon) school districts.

Under the newly created Northside Lion educator minigrant, anyone in Reeths-Puffer or North Muskegon schools could apply for a \$200.00 mini-grant to fund ideas or items that would best meet the needs of the students in our community. The mini-grant team set the criteria for the grants, and it is as follows: Fon grants up to \$200.00 each would be awarded that enhance instructional programs and include but are not limited to new projects or programs, program enhancement within the curriculum framework, and those that serve and better our community, special events, learning opportunities for students, parent involvement programs, etc. All recipients must maintain receipt of their spending and complete an assessment to be shared with Lion members in the spring.

Our Northside Lion board approved \$2,000.00 (10 grants) for our first year of funding for the 2021-22 school year. Several people applied from both school districts. It was apparent in this first year that the need was there. After reporting to our club members at a general meeting, one of our Northside Lion members donated additional funds in the second and third years. This generous donation, in addition to the additional funding by our board, allowed us to fund twenty-one grants in year two for a total of \$4.187.00, although we still had to deny seventeen. In year three (2023-24), grant applications were down in the fall. We received twenty-one and awarded seventeen for a total of \$3,160,00. This is when, once again, our Lion member donors stepped up with additional funds to assist the remaining board-granted funds from the fall of the 2023/24 school year. The mini-grant team assembled again and decided to offer a chance at second grants for this year. The only added stipulation for this additional grant was that applicants could not have received a grant from us in the fall. We hoped that the grant monies could reach even more students and classrooms. Seventeen grants were submitted, one was denied, and our board granted an additional four hundred dollars to cover two additional applications that also met the grant criteria. One other Lion member donated the other two hundred dollars, so all but one grant application was awarded for the second round in 2023-24 school year, for a total of thirty grants for last school year. For the 2024-25, our board approved \$3,000.00 for grants to enhance education. With thirty- three ex ceptional grants, the mini gra committee went to the board and the members for a special consideration. We asked if any member would want to sponsor one of the grants, so we could cover all thirty- three. Our members graciously donated another \$1,500. 00 for grants, so our board approved a "match' of our member donations

To this date, the Northside Lions have donated \$ 20,854.00 to support and improve our local schools and community. The one hundred and six grants that have been awarded were for a variety of things such as building libraries, flexible seating/creative common space, career study through play, clean-up efforts for our local parks, and the study and planting of local pollinators just to name a few. The mini-grant ideas that have been submitted over the years have been creative and assisted Northside Lions in living up to their motic: "We Servel" Our grant has evolved from a "need basis" due to a global pandemic to supporting creative ideas that expand the ideas and learning outside local classroom walls.

Hopefully, if funding remains, we can continue our educator mini-grant well into future years.
